An egg-cellent Easter!

I'd encourage you to have a wee check around for Easter eggs next time you sit down in church. Over the Easter holidays, Young Crown arranged four Easter egg hunts – I personally hid several hundred of them and I'm not totally sure all have yet been found. The egg hunts tell a story in themselves – which I share in the hope you enjoy some of what we're up to and why we have had so many egg-hunters around in the last few weeks!

The first of the hunts was undertaken by the children, staff, parents and many other friends + relatives at the Crown Primary School end-of-term service. What a privilege it is to be able to lead these services – to invite the whole school in and to share some of the beauty and joy of the Easter story with them all. What a delight to see an amazing group of Primary 1 children share some story, poem and song all about why we love this time of year too.

Another hunt later that day was held for the young people at the Friday Drop In. I've just loved spending Friday afternoons with the regulars – they come down for lunch, stay for some games and activities, enjoy the chat and banter and eventually will be hitting the streets by about 5pm (sometimes four-and-a-half hours after arriving!!) Our provision of this club has been both well received and useful in maintaining and building our relationships with young people who had come up through Energize throughout the last few years.

There was an egg hunt also as part of the entertainment of the day on Good Friday's BIG Footprint all-age event. The aim of the event was to join in with a national initiative to use Easter weekend as a point of connection between different generations and do something great together. Oh boy, the sun shone for us too! We had something like 60 / 70 people along for a 1.7 mile walk, bacon rolls for lunch, some arts and crafts; and an egg hunt in there for good measure too. A great event, which truly met our expectations in terms of bringing out a crowd of people from all different ages and stages. There was a particularly strong showing of people who had taken up the invite via toddler groups – which was just a joy for me as it has been one of the ministry areas we've well committed to over the last few years.

Another egg hunt happened during the opening night of our new youth club YC inc. We were chuffed to finally launch a new-look-new-format club which has been the product of several months' work and imagination. The opening night seemed to go successfully – with young people transported not to a church hall, but to the Hall of Memories – a space which over the weeks will continue to become more and more special as we shape it with our own personalities, experiences, memories and different signs and thoughts from the amazing Bible stories we explore together. We've worked really hard to bring it together and we're so chuffed with

all of the support you've shown us in your prayers and your spreading the invitation far and wide.

If Easter eggs have any summary message I think it's that there is always hope of new life. In all circumstances, the Author of Life can have His will be done. So these Easter eggs tell the story of the continuing flourishing of new life in the work and ministry of Young Crown. Happy Easter to you!

Thanks to everyone who contributed towards the success of the week. We have included some more pictures on the next page.





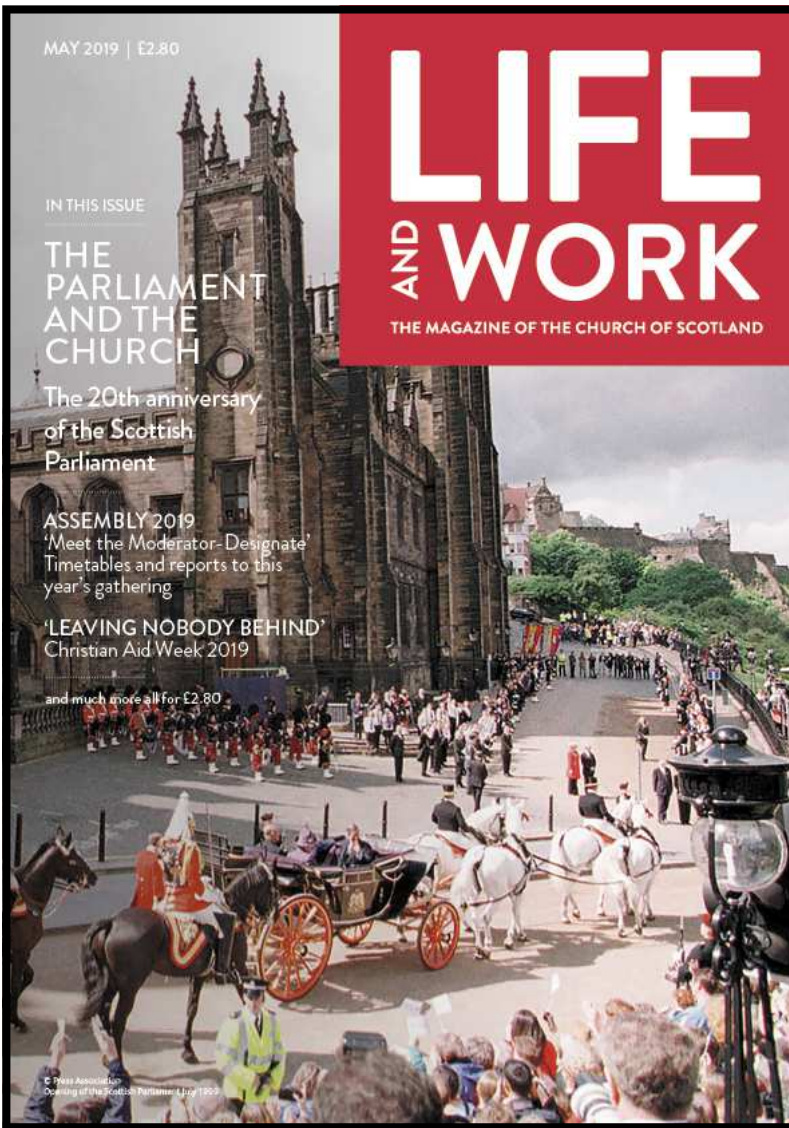
FLOWERS IN CHURCH

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The Elders' Council

We felt it might be helpful if, from time to time, the newsletter carried some brief information about the work of the Elders' Council.

The Elders' Council is the executive arm of the Kirk Session. All active elders along with some invited church members serve on one of its teams. The leaders of those teams, along with the Session Clerk, Depute Session Clerk and a representative from the Congregational Board (currently Bill Mein) comprise the Council. Team leaders are appointed for three years, and can be reappointed once.



The present team leaders who serve on the Elders' Council are as follows:

- Judith MacLeod (Youth and Children)
- Marion Forrest (Pastoral Care)
- Bruce Merchant (Communication)
- Jude Madeleine (Discipleship)
- David Crippin (Worship) and
- Mairi Main (Community and Outreach)

How does it operate

The Elders' Council was designed to allow for necessary work and for projects to be carried out with the minimum of red tape, and acts under specific powers delegated to it by the Kirk Session.

Each team arranges for the smooth running of concerns within their remit - for example the Worship Team ensures people will read at the 11am services.

They each determine their own future policy proposals and bring that to the Council or Kirk Session where necessary, then go ahead and carry out that policy - for example, the Community and Outreach Team recently arranged to make contact with all the new residents in the McCarthy and Stone development across the road, and invited everyone to an afternoon tea.

They respond to remits which come to us from the General Assembly or Presbytery - for example we were instructed by the General Assembly to hold a conference to determine the way forward for our congregation in the light **(cont on next page)**

(**cont from previous page**) of the national decline in church membership and to do this by looking again at The Church Without Walls report. This has led in our case to the formation of the Crown 20/20 group to look at how we might re-imagine the church premises as a community hub or focus.

Matters reported recently by Team Leaders

The Elders' Council last met on 3rd April. Each of the six team leaders gives a report. The following highlights some issues reported and discussed:

The Sanctuary

The day to day opening of the sanctuary and the safety implications of it not being staffed. What options may be available and further questions to pose to the Board who arrange buildings insurance cover.

District Elders

Members of the congregation expect a visit from their Elder not only as a reminder about Communion but also as a way of keeping in touch. Should there be a shortfall in visiting, for whatever reason, members may feel at a loss, particularly in a time of vacancy. Elders' Council is looking constructively at how to address any shortages and will be resolving with the approval of Kirk Session.

Organ Supply

During the vacancy to date, there has been considerable discussion and liaison between the Council and the Congregational Board with a view to placing these organ supply arrangements onto a more stable footing. Last month contractual arrangements were completed whereby Louis Jones plays three Sunday per month and Ian Livingstone on a fourth.

Finance

As was highlighted at the recent S.A.M., expenditure has exceeded income for several years and the shortfall will require to be addressed. In addition, projects such as Young Crown, the McGilp window and the 20/20 project bring with them a significant need for additional resources. Discussions around how all of this is best prioritised and managed continues.

Destruction of old records

There has been a considerable body of work to make Crown Church compliant with the new Data Protection rules concerning which records must be retained, for how long and which records should be destroyed.

Crown 20/20 May 2019 Newsletter

In 1906, the congregation of Crown ran a three day bazaar to clear the outstanding debt of £1200 from the £7000 cost of building the church. This was done with style, and the congregation even made a profit of £200. In today's terms, the amount raised at that bazaar would have been £168,000!

There have been numerous redecorations and refurbishments since then. Notably the addition of the upper hall in 1964, the addition of what is now the lounge and office in 1981, and the latest in 2001 when we reorganised the available space to give us the new large kitchen and new toilets, and redecorated the halls.

Twenty years is a considerable length of time without major redecoration, and the halls particularly are rather shabby. Crown 20/20 has carried out a survey of all organisations using the halls, asking them to dream about their ideal space. The results of the survey which has been carried out with all our hall users were shared with about 120 of the congregation at an after-church meeting on 28th April, and these will form the basis of our plans for the future. Jimmy Gray thanked everyone for coming, and expressed his thanks to all those who have already sent in their personal suggestions and thoughts to us. As he said, we are all part and parcel of the decisions about our future plans, and of their implementation.

Our church sits in a fantastic location in an area which has no community centre. Currently, we have almost 300 young people, 160 adults attending community organisations which meet in our halls, and up to 100 of the congregation in any one week using the halls. Between them it has been suggested that we:

- Upgrade our kitchen and toilets, possibly adding showers
- Considerably improve our disabled access both inside and out, upstairs and down
- Improve storage areas which will free up space in the halls and make cleaning easier
- Improve the sound system throughout
- Make better use of the total floor space to provide the meeting areas we have identified
- Think of being able to offer a conference facility
- Consider offering the Olive Grove suitable space within the buildings and consider the provision of an adjacent soft play area
- Have much improved Wi-Fi



We have included some photographs on this and the next page of 2 recently renovated churches, one being St Bryce in Kirkcaldy and the other being the Steeple in Dundee.

These improvements could lead to, for example:

- First class facilities which could 'grow' Young Crown
- Enable the provision of a Lunch Club
- Film evenings/discussions
- Provide additional office space / access to photocopying and printing facilities
- Allow us to offer support for mental health patients and their carers
- The provision of a church caretaker to have the buildings staffed.



This presentation was followed by an inspiring video from LochEwe Community Church (watch it on <https://freechurch.org/news/loch-ewe-community-church-complete-refurbishment>) about their recent renovations which were led by 4 stalwarts of the congregation whose combined ages totalled over 310 years! Amazing, considering also the physical work which they themselves

undertook to save money. But what came over most strongly was their conviction that "The Lord wanted this building saved", and that He provided the necessary people for each phase. And supremely, their reliance on prayer "when the kitty was running a bit short" .

There are many other churches which have recently carried out extensive alterations. Should you be near one of these, or any others in your holidays, please try and bring us back suggestions and good ideas. There is no point in re-inventing the wheel! Mannofield, Aberdeen, The Steeple, Dundee, Bankfoot Church Centre, Dunning Church, St Bryce Kirkcaldy, Auchterarder Parish Church and Kinross Parish Church.



The Olive Grove

Team Olive Grove had a celebration to mark the cafe's tenth anniversary on Saturday 27th April which was attended by 43 volunteers past and present. The occasion also marked the retirement of our long serving Treasurer Donald Matheson who has diligently kept us on the right financial road for the past decade, something we all greatly appreciate. He and Beth were presented with a voucher and a conservatory plant. Donald's place as Treasurer will be taken over by Liz Gray. Also being presented with a cheque for £250, and cutting our 10th birthday cake was Aileen, currently our youngest volunteer, who is building up funds to take part in a Vine Trust expedition.

Reviewing the past ten years, Mairi commented that, while there is plenty of change

and renewal in volunteers and customers, one thing remains consistent: through the Olive Grove, we continue to be given the opportunity to make strangers welcome and in time make strangers friends. And so we can continue to think of the Olive Grove in terms of blessing - which the Oxford English Dictionary defines so well as 'God's favour and protection.'

At its best, the Olive Grove is a blessing to everyone who contributed to its set up, to all its volunteers and its guests past and present, and to everyone who receives from its profits.

Thinking on those who contributed, we took time to reflect on the remarkable foresight of Rev Willis Jones in identifying a lasting opportunity for outreach, his fearless approach to fundraising, which Donald could recall in greater depth, given his close links with the financial planning stage and Willis's ability to pick and enthuse his initial team of Angy, Eileen Lily, Rae, Ruby, Anne, Renee and others. Truly, a man to whom we have good reason to be very grateful.

As volunteers, we learn to rely on one another as shoppers, as bakers, as accounts keeper, as bankers, as treasurer, as cooks and servers. We exchange shifts when necessary; we pick up hints and tips from one another and we support one another at melt down moments, like multiple orders for different foods and drinks, with two cappuccinos and a hot chocolate thrown in for good measure.

And we are blessed emotionally and spiritually by being warmed, on a down day, by the company of colleagues, by chat with our guests, by a compliment on our cooking ... even if it was down to the soup maker on the previous shift. And we have the satisfaction of continuing to practise skills well after we have left paid employment. This certainly came home to a number of us at the funeral of one lovely volunteer who had continued to supply the cafe with beautiful baking despite



evidently failing health until almost the end of her life. The reason: she had once run a hotel and simply loved giving hospitality; baking allowed her to express who she was.

And so we are grateful to all volunteers, past and present, who have been part of the Olive Grove journey, and especially to our most recent volunteers who bring with them new ideas and make it possible for us to carry on. We hope too that our teenage volunteers who spend time as part of Duke of Edinburgh or Saltire awards enjoy building up customer and practical skills they can carry long into the future.

Our guests - 'customers' seems a colder word - are we hope also blessed by a place in which to share a simple meal with friends or to come solo to enjoy a quiet moment. Sometimes we are privileged to see a guest with learning difficulties gain confidence and blossom. More recent volunteers may not know that one little lady with a great fondness for scones, and plenty to say, was once almost too shy to ask for one. Those with longer Olive Grove memories will fondly recall a lady from Barra who, as she became more at home, would burst, most tunefully, into Gaelic song, winning applause. Sometimes we can be unaware of circumstance, as when one elderly lady said how much she enjoyed the soup, because she'd now forgotten how to follow recipes. So, though we can't change the difficulties in individual lives, we are privileged to help create good moments.

... and our regular guests are more than ready to be supportive in drawing into friendly conversation anyone who appears solitary or depressed. So many thanks to them too .. without their custom, and occasional patience when things are a little hectic ... we couldn't continue.

And lastly, we are blessed in our capacity to **give financially** through the Olive Grove. At December 2018, just over £22,000 had been contributed to a wide range of projects locally and abroad since we started. A further £4,000 will be distributed in the near future to church projects for Crown, St Ninian's and St Stephen's and to Mikeysline. So, acting together, we are privileged to exercise generosity far in excess of our individual means.

So we'll be moving forward prayerfully, in good heart and remembering, beyond occasional tribulations, plumbing problems etc, the verse from Hebrews (King James version): **Be not forgetful to entertain strangers; for thereby some have entertained angels unawares.** Now, there's a thought!
