## Potential use of Pews

The preference would be to give regular attenders of Crown Church or their families first option should they wish to have a unique memento of the church. So anyone who has an interest should waste no time in letting us know.
People would have seen in several places their potential use and pews can be extremely attractive, if not the most comfortable, form of seating. Anyone who is passing the café immediately adjacent to the Old High Church can see a full pew in regular use.

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The photo of a shortened pew gives a reasonable idea of how they can be reduced to make something unusual, -in this case a piece of front hall furniture.

In other instances, they are kept longer to fit a greater space. Or they can be painted or treated to sit in a garden. So, it all depends on the set of circumstances of those that wish to acquire one.

We have had discussions with some people with the knowledge and skills to adapt the pews. If you are interested, please let us know and we will try our very best to come up with a solution that fits your needs.

## Update Jamaica



A huge thank you to everyone in Crown Church and beyond who contributed to our Jamaican Appeal earlier in the year. We had set ourselves a target of $£ 1,750$ to repair 15 computers in the North Street Church Cyber Centre, which duly happened.

However, thanks to the generosity of all and a special thank you to Christian Gudgeon of Gairloch, who contributed $£ 500$ from an extended and quite enormous Lenten beach clean, the final amount sent to Kingston, including Gift Aid, reached £5,008.

With this our partners in Kingston were able to purchase 3 additional desktop computers for the Cyber Centre and to refurbish the air conditioning in the Cyber Centre to make it more comfortable for users, something particularly important in the heat of downtown Kingston.

Covid lockdown has most severely disrupted the education of poorer pupils without access to online learning. So, the remaining funds were used to secure 15 tablets for students in Primary School and learners in most need in the Church School. Some of a number of photos showing the award ceremony, which was part of North Street's 184th Anniversary Service are included. We also hope to place, on Crown Church website, a video of the most recent award ceremony of scholarships from the North Street United Educational Development Fund to which Crown Church has contributed with funds which are rolled forward for the support of the next group of students.

As well as being extremely grateful to everyone who contributed, we are greatly indebted to our partners in Kingston who run the NSU Educational Development Fund so carefully and effectively. We pray God's blessing on their continuing efforts and on the students they support.

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## Stamp Appeal 2021.

This year the Stamp Project proceeds will benefit The Women's Development Centre (WDC) in Kandy, Sri Lanka which runs a project to support women and girls who have been victims of rape and sexual violence.

The WDC gives these women somewhere to stay, and supports them in caring for their children, helps them return to education if they wish, and trains them in skills they can use to make a living when they leave. The WDC has a social enterprise and café where the women can work and sell their hand-made products. The team at WDC care for and heal girls who are vulnerable and often discarded by their families. It is impossible not to be moved by what they do. Help support them by collecting used stamps which are then sold on.
