I am happy to report that, at the time of writing, Douglas and Alison are "in transit" on their way back to Scotland. By the time you receive the newsletter they will, hopefully, be safely back in the Manse.

Things have certainly not stood still in their absence. There is a lot going on and I would like to take this opportunity to bring a few things to everyone's attention.

Church Conference. Firstly, Brian Macgill and Eileen Ardern are jointly organising our church conference which will take place in our newly refurbished upper hall on Saturday 12th February. It will start at 10 o'clock in the morning and continue through until approximately 3:30 in the afternoon. There will be a break in the middle for a soup and sandwich lunch.

The conference is open to everyone and it is very much hoped that people who have not attended an event of this kind before (never having been invited before) will take this opportunity to accept the invitation this time. The theme of the conference is essentially "Mission", particularly how we make best use of our strengths and our newly refurbished premises to reach out to our local community. Speakers will be Paul Haringman who is the Presbytery Mission Development Officer, and our own minister, Reverend Douglas Robertson together with Struan McRoberts from Young Crown. Struan's dad, Reverend Doug McRoberts, will also give an update on the current progress towards our "Super Presbytery".

It promises to be a really interesting and engaging day and I do hope as many of you as possible will take the opportunity to attend. Even if you are not able to attend in person, arrangements have been made to attend via "zoom". The Crown school car park should be available for parking on the day. Alpha Course. We are continuing to develop close links with our friends in Old High/St Stephen's. I know that many of you enjoyed the daily videos which appeared during Advent. This was a very successful joint venture which we hope to repeat next Christmas. Consideration is also being given to the possibility of running a similar project during the season of Lent.

However, we are also running jointly with Old High/St Stephen's an Alpha Course which will take place on Monday evenings, starting Monday 7th March. The meetings will all take place in our newly refurbished upper hall starting at 7 o'clock with soup and a sandwich. Lent House Groups. Preparations are also now well underway to run a series of house groups during Lent. These have proved so popular that some of the house groups formed previously have continued to run right through the year (via zoom). Those participating in these groups have found them very enjoyable and stimulating. They are an excellent way to explore faith issues in a very relaxed and informal setting. Church Buildings. I am happy to report that, despite the many delays which have been occasioned for a variety of reasons, the work on the church buildings is now proceeding at quite a swift pace.

It is hoped that all of the necessary works (including the installation of the lift to the upper hall) will have been completed by the end of March. The lift will probably not be operational quite that early as it has to be "commissioned" after its installation which will involve a short delay before we can use it.

The present timetable will have the nursery schoolchildren moving into their new nursery in our former lower hall after the Easter break. It will be a great relief to have the Midmills corridor back in action and we can then look forward to making maximum use of our refurbished premises.

The work to remove the pews from the central portion of the sanctuary, level the floor and re-site the organ should be completed by the end of February. This is an important development since it will allow us to make much better use of the space in the sanctuary during the week. You still have an opportunity to buy one or more of the pews and those interested in doing so should contact Eileen Ardern without delay at eileenardern@hotmail.com

However, there is no time to relax, since plans to develop a new entrance to the church adjacent to the garden are now nearing completion and will hopefully be put to the congregation for approval later this year. Further details will appear on the church website shortly.

So, huge challenges remain but I think we can perhaps congratulate ourselves on the excellent progress which we have made so far.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Stewart Robertson and the Reverend Doug McRoberts for leading the 11 o'clock services so well during Douglas's absence in Australia. I must also thank the Reverend Morven Archer and her team for doing the same with the 9:30 services which are continuing to thrive and be well supported in their new home in the upper hall. It is a pleasure to see so many young people attending these services and hopefully many more will join them in the weeks and months ahead.

Toddler Nativity Service

What a special time we had here at Young Crown and Crown Church at Christmas! Our end of term toddler group sessions had a very special visitor and we had loads of fun drawing the term to a close with presents for all of the wee ones, but there was even more in store for our beloved little friends. In spite of a last-minute policy changes and a general rise in anxiety surrounding the Omicron variant, we were able to safely and suitably run a Christmas Eve service specially for little ones – the first one we've ever done.

So many elements to this service were complete unknowns, not least because we had never done anything like it before so there was no template to refer back to! Who would come? How would it work? What would the reception be? How do we know whether it was a good thing to do (or qualify success)?



In the first instance, even considering running such a service should serve as a marker for success. It stands as testament to the great work we've been doing in running toddler groups and reconnecting with the community through them that we have so many friends to put on a service for. The fact is that even just approaching people we know and who know we care about them and inviting them to such a service is a big positive. Not only were we able to advertise far and wide that we want to do something special for the little ones this Christmas, we were also able to personally invite over 40 families who are connecting with us on a regular basis – that's fantastic news!

With a degree of nervousness leading up to the event, I found myself thinking that I'd have been happy even just with that as an outcome (partly because it was beginning to look like we wouldn't be allowed to run the service for a while); but WOW! The day came and I was blown away by what happened...

On the day we managed to pull together a lovely and really well received service – all within the COVID restrictions and with plenty of life and atmosphere. The turnout of 49 people made it comparable with the traditional carol service later in the day, which was just a phenomenal return.

We made special hats (with everyone doing their own crafting and colouring at their pews); we sang some well-known carols (and even did twinkle twinkle little star, with some verses I bet you didn't know existed); we followed the story of the birth of Jesus from the Beginner's Bible and we visited Mary and Joseph and the newborn baby in the stable – bringing our own gifts of light as we went.

I'm so grateful to everyone who played a part in the service, from planning to

assisting on the day, playing music and especially our super Mary and Joseph who did a fantastic job.

There's something magical about Christmas, isn't there? Well, there most certainly was at Crown Church on Christmas Eve with the little ones celebrating.

Here at Young Crown, we're getting going with a whole lot of new work for the new year. Hoping you have had just as much of a magical time remembering the birth of Jesus and how light came into the world.

Session 4: "I believe in building people up" - how we respond to poverty


Session 5: Housing (in)justice

Update from Crown 20/20 Group

"Crown Church aims to invest in a major upgrade of our church buildings to provide a warm and welcoming home for worship, equip us with modern and accessible Facilities to support Christian outreach into our community and to

help our church meet the needs of that community."

Dear Members of the Congregation

As Covid-19 restrictions ease, the Crown 2020 Group is looking forward to a new year with great expectations. Expectations that we can continue to make real progress in upgrading our historic place of worship and creating a community hub at the heart of the Crown area.

The first development to update you on is that work will commence on Monday 14th February in the Sanctuary. This will see removal of pews in the central aisle, the re-siting of the organ to a more advanced position (under the screen) and the levelling and polishing of the flooring. Replacement of the pews with comfortable individual seats, which can be easily stored, will create a more flexible area for use by the congregation and the growing number of church and community groups who wish to base themselves within our church building. The new seating is expected to arrive in time for our Communion services to be held in the Sanctuary on Sunday 6 March. Ian Ferguson Contractor, who upgraded the Upper Hall, will carry out the work in the Sanctuary, and we are grateful to our organist Richard Cunningham for offering to help with the removal and refitting of the electrical leads to the organ.

The 11 am services on Sunday 20 February and Sunday 27 February will be held in the Upper Hall while the work in the Sanctuary is carried out. A livestream of the service in the lounge will be provided for anyone who cannot manage the stairs.

Morrisons are now working to fit out the nurseries, the small hall the new kitchen and toilets downstairs and hope to be finished by Easter. They are currently working on the fire alarms throughout, linking them to those already installed in the Upper Hall. They will shortly be fitting new fire doors from the Sanctuary to the Midmills corridor.

In the Upper Hall, we are delighted that a completion certificate has been granted for the upgrade. The hall is now in active use for 9.30 am services, for after-service refreshments and accommodating meetings of some church groups. The installation and commissioning of the lift to the Upper Hall by the end of March, and the reinstatement of the fire escape before Easter will allow a full resumption of church and community activities.

Eager to maintain momentum, Crown 20/20 is actively discussing the next phase of the redevelopment project, starting with plans for a consultation with the congregation over a new entrance to the church. Draft plans are available on our web site.

Remaining positive throughout the challenges of Covid-19 has been a key to the progress we have made. Converting an ageing building poses challenges - not least the number of unwelcome surprises that have cropped up when a wall or floor is opened up. We would all have preferred to have kept to projected completion deadlines, but this has simply has not been possible.

Thanks again for your patience and understanding as we strive to deliver the aims of our project.



Youth Column: Prepared for Anything

Life and Work Friday January 7

Michael Macaulay, a young Boys' Brigade leader, describes how the BB adapted to Covid-19

March 2020 presented us all with a big challenge – Covid-19. We all had to stay at home, adapt to new ways of working and for some reason struggle to get toilet roll! Rather naively I thought that after three weeks we would be back to normal – how wrong I was!

I have been a member of the Boys' Brigade since the age of five and after completing my Queen's Badge I decided to stay on as a leader with the 3rd Inverness based at Crown Church.

The Boys' Brigade suspended all face-to-face activity a week before the country went into lockdown. The Boys' Brigade quickly adapted and produced a new digital programme called #BBatHOME – a fantastic range of resources that our children and young people could do while at home. It was great to see on social media what our children and young people were up to.

After a few weeks and no sign of lockdown lifting it was time to look at running virtual sessions – something we had never had to do before. At first these sessions were purely as a catch-up with our children and young people to ensure they were all safe and well. However, as time moved on and knowledge of how Zoom worked improved, so did our programme.

My BB company tried many different activities over the lockdowns, like crafts, quizzes, and games. We even attempted to cook together live – something that ordinarily would be logistically difficult to do in person due to numbers. My favourite dish that we made was a very simple chicken curry only using a few ingredients.

Each and every session was a reminder of how important youth work is for children and young people, particularly in the midst of living through such difficult times.

As restrictions began to lift it was great to be able to meet with our young people, albeit in smaller groups and outdoors. An outdoor programme was another way of working that we hadn't really had to do apart from summer games in the park or at annual camps.

Surprisingly, we were very lucky with the weather apart from a heavy shower one evening when it was supposed to be dry! We were based in a marquee that was assembled and unassembled every evening — and this provided great shelter to us. With practice we got our marquee up quicker every week.

Now that restrictions have started to lift it is great to be back running BB activities indoors for our young people. The experience of running activities in new ways still carries on and we are now not afraid to run new activities.

The biggest learning point (personally for me) during the pandemic is that new activities work and not to be afraid to try delivery in a new way.

Hopefully we won't have lockdowns to deal with again in the future, however if we do the Boys' Brigade and youth work leaders across the country can build on their experiences from the past two years and will be prepared for anything that is thrown at them!

There is a training session on Wednesday 16th February 9.30 to 1pm online.


Walks would be gentle, local and sociable, with two leaders required per walk. I can provide more info about the training and how to sign up etc if folk are interested.
