From the Minister

Dear friends,

In our sermons over the last month, at both the 9:30am and 11am services, and continuing through the summer, we have been looking at what “the five marks of mission” mean. These have been adopted by the General Assembly with the intention of helping us to refocus on our calling, which is to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ and the Kingdom of God, to nurture and care for one another, the community around us and the environment, and to stand up against injustice.



And as I write this, I am also reflecting on the sacrament of Holy Communion, which will be celebrated on the first Sunday in June. It is a deeply profound and solemn service of worship, which commemorates the death of Jesus. As we pass the elements around the congregation, we acknowledge, “this is the body of Christ, given for you”, and “this is the blood of Christ, given for you.”

This sacrament reminds us of the very heart of the gospel that we are called to proclaim: Jesus Christ, given for us.

This is our faith and our motivation, to follow Jesus, who fed the hungry, healed the sick and forgave the sinner. He socialised with the poor and social outcasts, and challenged the abuse of authority by leaders both religious and civic. And he taught – especially in the parables – of a glorious Kingdom where love, peace, grace, forgiveness, healing and wholeness are the “rule of law” of the one true King.

Jesus is our role model, the hero of our faith, but he is so much more. Only God has the authority to forgive sin. This is the “blasphemy” which was used against Jesus by those who were upset by his very direct criticism of their leadership in the Jewish faith. They were also frustrated that he was attracting great crowds and influencing the community in a way that they never could. So they turned him over to the Roman authorities who were no less corrupt as they contrived to execute a man whom even Pilate recognised was innocent.

But it was never blasphemy in the first place, because Jesus truly was the embodiment of the fullness of the creator God. In his life he showed glimpses of the glory of the Kingdom, but even his disciples didn’t understand the full extent of Jesus’ divinity until after the resurrection, and it was only then that they received their commission from Jesus to “go and make disciples of all nations” (Matt 28:19).

This is the church we belong to, united with all Christian believers in the faith that is symbolised in the sacrament of Holy Communion: Jesus Christ, given for us.

Unitary Constitution

You might remember (then again you might not since it is a while ago) that we held a congregational meeting within the sanctuary on Sunday, 19th December 2021. At that meeting we agreed to move from our present constitution to adopt the unitary constitution of the Church of Scotland.

Following that meeting, I then made an application through Presbytery to obtain the necessary permission to move to the unitary constitution.

Presbytery approved the application at their subsequent meeting and the matter was then referred to the law department at 121 George St for approval. Approval has very recently been received and accordingly we now operate, as a church, under the unitary constitution.

The main difference is that we no longer have a Congregational Board and all of the business of the church will now be overseen by the Kirk Session.

It is quite important to point out that none of this changes any of the activities going on within the church. Everything continues just as before. The only real difference is that the decision-making process has now been simplified.

By the time you are reading this newsletter, the Kirk Session will have met and hopefully have agreed to form 2 new committees, a finance committee and a property committee. These 2 committees will substantially oversee the work which was formerly carried out by the Congregational Board.

We do have the opportunity of forming further committees and having a more careful look at both how the Kirk Session and Elders' Council are structured. However, at its meeting in March this year, the Kirk Session agreed that it would not be appropriate to contemplate any further changes until such time as the proposed union with Old High, St Stephen's has been completed. We recognise that it is important that those joining us should have a say in how we structure our church.

However, having said that, Old High, St Stephen's have been operating under a unitary constitution for some years and they will undoubtedly be able to bring some valuable experience into the forthcoming discussion.

I think it is also important that I take this opportunity of publicly thanking all of the members of the Congregational Board, past and present, for the sterling service which they have given, in some cases over many years, to the important, indeed quite essential work which the Congregational Board has carried out

As indicated above, the need for that work continues and anyone who would like to become involved in the new committees should, in the first instance contact myself. We are a very busy church and we do need everyone who can, to play an active part in the life and work of our church.

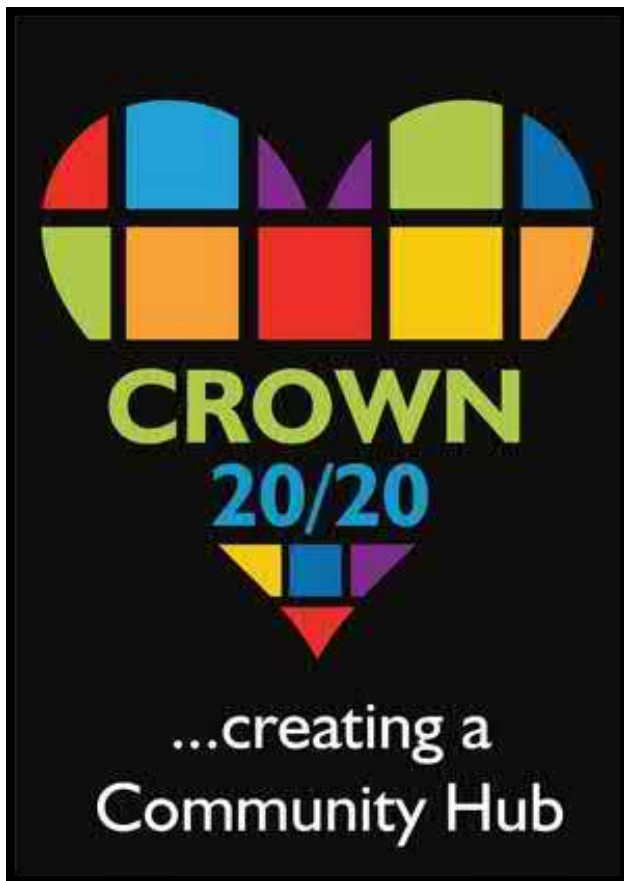

Update from Crown 20/20 Group

“Crown Church aims to invest in a major upgrade of our church buildings to provide a warm and welcoming home for worship, equip us with modern and accessible Facilities to support Christian outreach into our community and to help our church meet the needs of that community.”

Dear Members of the Congregation

While Morrison Construction put the finishing touches to the Lower Hall, creating two nursery classrooms for Crown Primary School, the focus of our attention has been planning the upgrade of lighting and the AV system in the Sanctuary as well as making safe our attic and the refurbishment of the Lounge.

News about the conversion of the Lower Hall is that the contractor hopes to complete the work by the 17th of June, with the children moving into their new surroundings at the start of the new school session in mid August.

Still to be completed is the impressive glass entrance from Crown Primary School into the new nursery unit, which accommodates the fire escape. We are assured that just as soon as a building warrant is granted for completion of the works, we can begin to use the new 8-person lift to the Upper Hall.

As we reported in the last edition of the newsletter, we have received a grant of £74,343 from the Place-Based Investment Programme to carry out some of the necessary repairs and upgrades to the church. This is a fund administered by The Highland Council on behalf of the Scottish Government to support capital projects which deliver on community-led regeneration. Subject to approval from Church HQ, the grant will allow us to upgrade the lighting and the audio visual equipment in the Sanctuary. We also intend to improve access to our attic with wider walkways and provision of handrails and improve the insulation there. Secondary double glazing will be installed in the MacGill window to reduce heat loss. Progress has been made with the Presbytery Property Committee and the General Trustees over permissions connected with the work proposed which is covered by the PBIP grant. We now need to send in specific proposals to the General Trustees for their meeting on 21 June. Ian Ferguson Contractors, the firm that carried out the upgrade of the Upper Hall and work in the Sanctuary when we removed the pews, are ready to carry out the attic contract once we get the green light. We have received proposals for improving the lighting in the Sanctuary from three companies and these are being considered. Plans for the AV upgrade are also under active consideration.

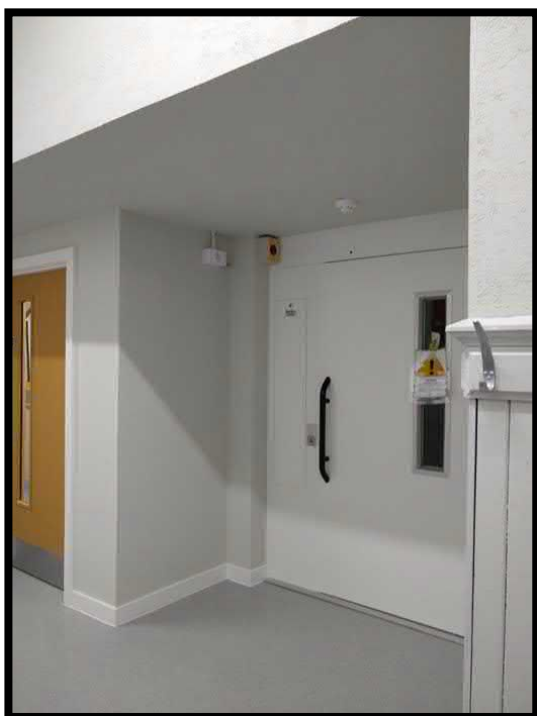

The Midmills corridor has been given a facelift thanks to a small team of volunteer painters and this area appears much bigger now thanks to the extra space created around the lift door. The emergency phone in the lift goes through firstly to the emergency out of hours team at The Highland Council who would send an appropriate engineer. Gordon Cameron, Jimmy Gray and Bob Forrest also have their numbers programmed in as fall back contacts. The lift will be maintained and serviced by the Council.



The upgrade of the lounge floor is completed and The Olive Grove team are furnishing this area so that they can resume the service they provide to the local community. It is hoped the Olive Grove will be open to the general public on Wednesdays and Thursdays by July.

In summary, excellent progress continues to be made and by the time of the next newsletter we hope to be in a position to report completion of the Lower Hall works; full use of the lift; an imminent opening of the Olive Grove in the Lounge and confirmation of the Sanctuary and Attic improvements.

Following on from the short appreciation of Jimmy Gray in last month's Newsletter, Jimmy was persuaded to reflect on his long life of service to our community more fully.

Jimmy Gray's 22 years of civic service

Chair of our Crown 20/20 Group, Jimmy Gray, has retired as a Highland Councillor after 22 years of outstanding civic service. Jimmy did not seek re-election to the Millburn Ward on The Highland Council at the recent election, wishing to spend more time with his wife, Liz, children Aileen, Rhona and Robert and grandchildren, Georgia, Alex, Erin, Rebecca, Molly and Lily. During his time as a councillor Jimmy served as Leader of the Labour Group, Provost of Inverness, Convener of The Highland Council; Chair of the strategic and area Planning Committees as well as a number of other strategic committees. He was also Chairman of the Cromarty Firth Port Authority and a Board member of Highlands and Islands Enterprise. Here is Jimmy's story.

"For much of my working life, I worked in the energy construction industry. For short spells in nuclear at Dounreay, coal at Longannet, hydro at Foyers and for 25 years in the oil and gas supply industry with McDermott's at Ardersier, where for a long period I was the Union Convener, experiencing the peaks and troughs of the industry. Our workforce fluctuated from 30 employees to 4,000, being the largest private employer in the Highlands.

With the rundown of oil and gas construction, I left the industry and was elected as a Labour councillor to The Highland Council in 2000 - just as Inverness was becoming a city, being granted this status by the Queen to mark the Millennium.

The Highland Council was the biggest employer in the Highlands with 10,000 staff and a budget of more than £700 million, delivering the majority of public services, including education, roads and transport, social work, housing and leisure and recreation.

There were 80 councillors when I joined the Council, 26 in the Inverness area, and listening to early advice, I focused my energies on areas in which I believed I was best suited. Over the years, in addition to the work in my Ward, which started as Crown and then developed into what presently is Millburn, I served on and chaired numerous strategic committees. These included one of the busiest planning application committees in Scotland the South Planning Application Committee, the Highlands and Western Isles Valuation Board, the Resources Committee, The City of Inverness Heritage Trust, the Academy Street Project, the Energy and Climate Change Group of the North Sea Commission, the Lighthouse Board, the Highlands and Islands European Trust, Provost and Chairman of the City of Inverness and Area, Convener of Highland Council.

One of the highlights of my time with the council was being elected Provost of Inverness, civic and political leader of the City of Inverness. I consider the four years I spent serving as Provost as one of the greatest privileges and most rewarding of my life. I was extremely fortunate in the fact that I had Liz alongside me for most of the civic events. Without her support my period as Provost would have been much less rewarding and fulfilling.

It was a very busy time for both of us but it also allowed us experiences and opportunities to meet people that just would not have occurred in any other circumstance. Some days you could have three separate civic functions to attend as well as dealing with all the aspects of being political leader of Inverness, the newest city in Scotland and the fastest growing city in the UK at the time. There always has to be a Council Officer present when the Provost's chain is worn as it is valued at £450,000 and robes at £50,000. The Town House itself is a beautiful building and a great venue for civic receptions and welcoming people, locals and visitors alike.

One of my first actions as Provost was to strengthen the Kirking of the Council. I had always felt it was a really significant and important ceremony which had been allowed to almost wither away and lose its significance. I was invited by Caley Thistle to some of their most important home games as well as on some of their most memorable trips away including the unforgettable Cup triumph against the mighty Glasgow Celtic in 2000 and the Scottish Cup win over Falkirk in 2015. Other notable happenings were the growth of the University of the Highlands and Islands; the return of Faith Hope and Charity to Inverness; the construction of the city centre flood alleviation scheme, major streetscape work in the city centre; and the construction of the West Link, which has proved a huge benefit to the city. I had many memorable experiences including welcoming the Queen and Prince Philip to Culloden Battlefield for their first visit to the site. One of my most memorable events was to welcome the Dali Lama to Inverness. Exciting times! I firmly believe there are many synergies between my roles as a union convener and an elected Councillor and my involvement at Crown Church.

One of my biggest challenges was dealing with change. Change is inevitable but managing and dealing with it is where difficulties invariably arise as understandably individuals react to and adapt to change with varying degrees of scepticism and understanding. When asked to be part of and assist with the Crown 20/20 Group looking at the future needs of Crown Church, I was all too well aware that not everyone could move in the same direction, at the same pace even although there was an undoubted need for change and the Church of Scotland had made it abundantly clear, that to survive, churches had to adapt and change with some urgency. I am delighted that these challenges have been overcome and we have made some quite remarkable progress in upgrading our historic church building. Much of the thinking behind the 20/20 initiative is based on the belief that all our premises should be available for sharing and that modern, accessible first class facilities will support Crown Church in its mission and outreach to the wider community.

We are extremely grateful for the funding that we have received to allow us to make these improvements. As the changes take place to our church building we will be working along with Old High St Stephens as we take forward the Presbytery Plan for our area of the city. As they have experienced over recent years change, while inevitable, can be difficult.

With God's help we will be able to move forward and strengthen his church here in the older parts of Inverness by adapting and changing at a pace that recognises and responds to the needs of the community, and places us at the hub of local activity."

The next waypoint was to name the creature guarding the door at the main entrance to the Centre.



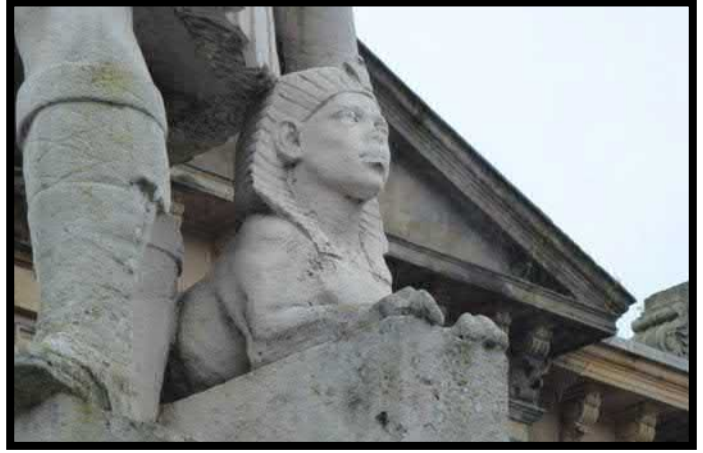

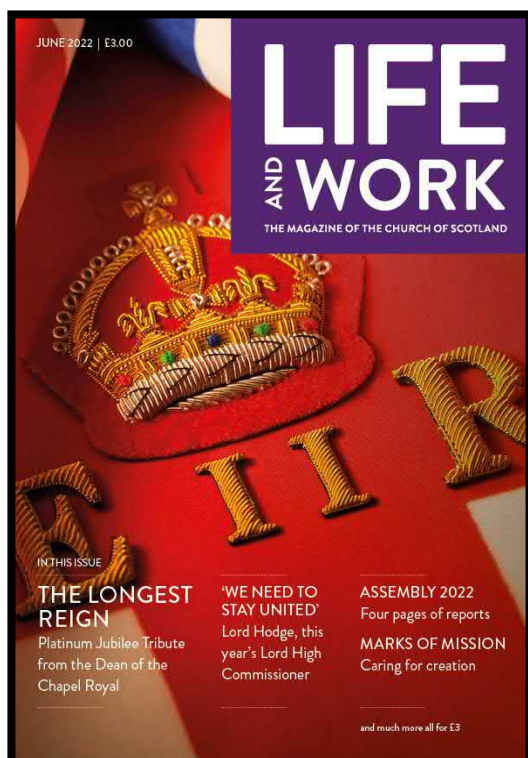
