From the Minister

Dear Members and Friends of Crown Church,

I was recently a bit of a fly on the wall, observing an online conversation about the use of Xmas as an abbreviation for Christmas. I don't know if any of you use it, and perhaps I risk offending you if you do, so please bear in mind that for the sake of brevity and simplicity I've been known to use it myself.

Some people in the conversation argued that it is not only legitimate, but profoundly meaningful, because X is the first letter of Christ in Greek - $\chi \rho_1 \sigma_1 \sigma_2$.

In the early days of the Christian church persecution was very real and often brutal. In order to protect themselves,



Christians developed a series of signs they could use, so that followers of Jesus might recognise each other, without it becoming obvious to other people.

In our modern times, the most well known of these ancient signs would be a simple

fish often just scraped into the ground \leq . The meaning behind this is that the word fish in Greek is an acronym for Jesus Christ God's Son Saviour. Of course, the symbol is so well known now that if someone puts a fish sticker on their car they are boldly proclaiming their faith to everybody, not just to other believers. Other symbols would include a simple cross signifying the crucifixion, or just the letter X, standing for Christ.

Another symbol that became common in the 4th century is usually called "Chi Rho",

 $^{\sharp}$ because chi and rho are the first two letters of Christ in Greek, though in the symbol they are usually written a wee bit funny. This wasn't a covert code for persecuted Christians, but was in fact adopted by Constantine, Emperor of Rome, following his own conversion to Christ. You will often see a chi rho symbol on something like a pulpit fall.

So in keeping with this long history of the Christian church using symbols, acronyms and abbreviations, using Xmas is perfectly reasonable, provided we remember that the X is an abbreviation of Christ in the Greek.

But when I was growing up, I remember my Mum expressing with some exasperation, her disappointment that so many people were using Xmas. In her mind they were taking Christ out of Christmas, and she pointed out that the letter X is used in maths as a symbol of the unknown. "But we know the one we celebrate at Christmas", she would say.

I imagine my Mum is not alone. She had no background in theological studies, no knowledge of the Greek language or the history of the church and its use of signs and symbols. This has always made me think that even if there is a rich history and theological depth behind the use of Xmas, which is why I really have no objection to people using it, yet I do wonder what it communicates to people outside of the church. Do they think, as my mother did, that we are taking Christ out of Christmas and replacing him with an unknown? Is this why so many commercial organisations prefer the abbreviation?

Perhaps, while we are still able to be open about our faith, unlike our brothers and sisters in the early church, and indeed in many parts of the world even today, we should be cautious about using an abbreviation which will only really be understood at its most profound level by "insiders". Let's continue to use the name of Christ openly, and especially in this season when we get more opportunities to proclaim his name in front of the world.

Christ is coming! Christ is coming! Come, Lord Jesus, quickly come! (from hymn 475 in our church hymnary)

The Church's Finances

Following the stated annual general meeting and approval of the church accounts which took place in November, now might be a good time to take stock of the church's financial position.

Whilst there is no cause for alarm, the net income of the church has decreased over the last 2 years whilst our expenditure has, and will inevitably, rise since the church is not immune from the cost of living crisis, quite the reverse!

In part at least, the decline in income has been due to the effects of the pandemic but, happily, we are now well on the way to emerging from the pandemic and returning to something resembling normality. However, things will never be quite the same as they were and we must look together towards a different future.

As a result of Covid, we have abandoned the former practice of taking the collection during the course of the service. Instead, collection bowls are being left at the 4 entrances into the sanctuary and worshippers are being asked to make their contributions on the way into the services.

We have now reinstituted the dedication of the offering during the 11 o'clock service.

However, it is appropriate to bring to everyone's attention that the need for continuing financial support is still there and that need is now greater than ever. For those of you who have been contributing regularly, your contributions are really appreciated but perhaps, given the increased costs the church is facing, you might consider increasing your contribution in this coming year. For others, perhaps you might consider making a regular financial contribution towards the work of the church either by way of standing order or by using the freewill offering envelopes.

If you are uncertain how to do this, please speak to either myself, either of the deputy treasurers (Liz Forbes and Liz Gray), or the freewill offering treasurer, Robert Hendry.

Our church really does need your support!

Prayer Diary December 2022 and January 2023

This prayer diary has been prepared by the Discipleship Team. We hope that you will find it useful. You may like to detach it from the newsletter and use it to pray for our church and community

December 4 - 10

Give thanks to God for the Advent season as we wait in anticipation with Hope, Peace, Joy and Love for the celebration of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Pray for the homeless and those cut off from their families, in particular during those long cold winter months, that practical help be made available to meet both their physical and spiritual needs.

Remember the families and friends who have been affected by substance use; may they receive love, compassion and support, and may God guide them through difficult times.

Pray today for people who have recently suffered bereavement – particularly those who are mourning a family member. Ask God to give them His comfort, strength and hope as they grieve, and to know He is their comforter.

December 11 - 17

Pray for all elderly people in our community, for those living in their own homes or nursing homes and care homes. Pray for strength, resilience and peace among them, their families and staff who support and help look after them.

Pray for those who live alone and are lonely. Pray also for people affected by mental illness, and ask that God will grant them strength and hope for the future.

Loving God, Blessed be the work of Your hands. Your Spirit inspires trees and birds and waves into song and dance. It is that same Holy wind that breathed on Your disciples and on all creation. Let Your Spirit blow us to creative love and stewardship that shows reverence for Your creation. Blessed be the works of Your hands, O Holy One, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, One God, now and forever. Amen.

Remember those in prison and pray they may feel a sense of peace and purpose as they serve their sentence. Pray that they can maintain a positive relationship with their families, wherever possible, and remembering those who have no visitors.

December 18 - 24

Pray Psalm 33: 20-22: "We wait in hope for the Lord; He is our help and our shield. In Him our hearts rejoice, for we trust in His Holy name. May Your unfailing love be with us Lord, even as we put our hope in You."

Pray for those who will find the coming festive season difficult; those who have lost loved ones recently and are facing the first Christmas without them or those who spend the festive period alone. Pray that God will be with them all and provide comfort. Father, help us to trust You when we have financial worries. Open our eyes to those around us who need our help and give us the courage and opportunities to be generous. Amen.

Lord, heal and bless our world. Bring comfort and hope as your light pierces the darkness. Amidst the doom-and-gloom reality we pray that Your love will illuminate and forge a path for all. Amen

December 25 - 31

We rejoice at the Christmas story and give thanks for the birth of Jesus, and knowing that He came on earth and died to save us. Pray that the real meaning of Christmas is not missed, and that the precious truth remains a reality in the hearts and lives of everyone.

Pray Isaiah 9:6: "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on His shoulders. And He will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace".

Give thanks to God for the New Year ahead, and hope and pray that each day of the coming year be filled with joy, peace and love.

Pray for all who are in care or nursing homes and for their families, friends and relatives. Give thanks for the dedications of the staff who work hard together to ensure the well-being of all people in those homes.

<u> January 1 - 7</u>

Pray for our hospitals. Thank God for the medical staff at our local hospital. Praise Him for the NHS and ask Him to lift the burden of busy workloads and long hours and to give the staff strength, joy and stamina to work hard and deliver excellent care to their patients.

Lift up the emergency services today and pray for the people in our daily lives who we often take for granted. Thank God for the everyday heroes who risk so much for us so that we can live safe lives, and pray for opportunities to thank them ourselves.

Give thanks for the Street Pastors and pray for spiritual guidance and strength for the work they do in helping and supporting vulnerable people in our town late in the nights.

Lift up people who have a difficult relationship with their family, and pray that God will touch their hearts and minds for help with mending broken relationships.

<u> January 8 - 14</u>

Pray Philippians 4:6-7: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your request to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

Pray for all those living with addictions; for assurance that there is a way forward and that they can lead strong and fulfilling lives. Pray for people who have been displaced due to conflicts; Give thanks for those who have been able to travel to safety and pray for support for them to adjust to a new life.

God Our Father, grant us stillness to pray; to acknowledge your presence with us as we travel through this life journey.

<u> January 15 - 21</u>

Pray for practical and political help for all those suffering from fuel poverty and for those most at risk in the cold. Ask God to open our eyes to neighbours or other people in our community who are perhaps struggling to heat their homes, and whether there's anything we can do to help.

Pray for God's light and love to shine into the minds of all who are depressed, anxious or suffering from dementia.

Remember those in prison and pray they may feel a sense of peace and purpose as they serve their sentence. Pray for their mental and physical wellbeing; may they use the opportunities to learn new skills and lead positive lives on release.

Pray for people living in fear in their own homes to be able to ask for help. Ask God to provide help for healing of the physical and psychological wounds of those who are suffering domestic violence, and pray for health and social care services, and the police, to be able to keep vulnerable people safe.

<u> January 22 - 28</u>

Thank and praise God for all the children and young people in our churches, communities, country and the world. Ask that God will walk alongside them and grant them courage, strength and wisdom as they face the challenges of life.

Lord, help us not to lean on our own understanding but in everything acknowledge You so that You can direct our words, thoughts and actions, In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Father we lift up the leaders of our country and all those that You have set up in places of authority to rule and govern our nation; for wisdom and guidance in making decision about the future of the country and well-being of the people.

Pray for all those in different parts of the world whose lives and livelihood have been affected by natural disasters, such as forest fires, floods and storms. Pray for support to enable them to rebuild their lives.

<u> January 29 – February 4</u>

Offer a prayer of personal thanks to God today: Lord, I thank You for prayer – that I can come before You and call You Father; that You listen to me and care about everything I bring before You. Today, above all else, I choose to give You thanks.

Pray for God's revival in our community and congregation. Ask God to open the eyes of the people around us, that they would see His unfailing love and sense His powerful presence and purpose for our lives.

Pray for peace in our world; that all people may live free from violence, in safety and security, and with hope for the future. We ask for wisdom for our leaders that they make appropriate decisions on behalf of all of us.

Lift up people who have a difficult relationship with their family, and pray that God will touch their hearts and minds for help with mending broken relationships.
