## **From the Minister**

Dear Members and Friends of Crown Church,

Behold, I make all things new

(Revelation 21:5)

It seems too late in the year already to wish you all a "Happy New Year", but I do sincerely hope that 2023 is a good year for each of you and your families, and for Crown Church and our partners in the Gospel in Old High St Stephens Church.

New Year is traditionally a time when we think about personal renewal, ditching bad habits, developing good ones, becoming a better version of our self. It's great to have that regular annual reminder, but in Christ I think we all know that renewal, being remade in the image of God, is not a once-a-year event, or even a weekly event at church on Sunday, but it is something we ought to contemplate and seek day by day.

Many of you will remember the song "Day by Day", from the stage and screen musical Godspell in the early 1970s. Perhaps less well know is that the words for that song were taken almost directly from a prayer that is usually ascribed to Richard de Wych, Bishop of Chichester in the 13<sup>th</sup> century.

Thanks be to you, our Lord Jesus Christ, for all the benefits which you have given us, for all the pains and insults which you have borne for us. Most merciful Redeemer, Friend and Brother, may we know you more clearly, love you more dearly, and follow you more nearly, day by day. Amen.

There is still a lot of work to be done to give effect to the Presbytery's Mission Plan, including the formal union of Old High St Stephens Church with Crown Church, and there will be challenges along the way, unforeseen obstacles, emotional struggles, and for many people there will be a very real sense of grief.

All of this makes it vitally important that we remind ourselves regularly of the spiritual purpose for which the church is seeking renewal, to refocus on Jesus Christ, to proclaim the Gospel to people who do not yet know him that they might come to him, and to nurture the faith of those who do believe, so that we might all together know him more clearly, love him more dearly and follow him more nearly, day by day.

## **Church Conference Report**

The conference was held in Crown Church with 70 delegates attending from both Old High St Stephens and Crown churches. Opening devotions were led by Pat Crippin and Ruth Martin with Pam McCulloch playing the piano.

The morning's business started with three presentations: firstly Doug McRoberts talking about changes in the Church of Scotland focusing on the reorganization of presbyteries, uniting the presbyteries of Argyll, Caithness, Sutherland, Ross, Inverness, Abernethy, Lochaber, Locharron-Skye, Uist and Lewis into a single Presbytery of the Highlands and Hebrides.

Secondly, Rev Douglas Robertson spoke about perspectives in ministry and underlined the importance of mission in the new church and seeing the way forward.

Thirdly, Brian Macgill delivered a presentation about planning a new church, contrasting the formalities of creating a new church with the actions of individual people who would become the new church, ending with a focus on Pastoral Care.

The morning's activity for delegates was to go into groups and discuss the two questions posed then script responses. The questions were: (1) What ensures good pastoral care? and (2) What are my top 10 priorities for the new church.

There was then a welcome break for a warming soup lunch, served upstairs by helpers from both Old High St. Stephens and Crown churches.

After lunch there was a brief summary given by Pat Crippin on the groups' morning feedback. The note from groups' feedback is on the following two pages of the newsletter. The next item was a presentation given by Christine Mackenzie on the outline of a process for finding a name for the new church. Both existing congregations are to be consulted and their respective Kirk Sessions to play their part: a process over several weeks with members invited to send name suggestions, in an envelope, to either of the Session Clerks.

Then Bob Forrest delivered a presentation about the process of transition (from two old churches to one new church) where creating a 'basis of union' (i.e. new name, buildings, place of worship, Kirk Session and parish boundaries) enables progress to be made and all to become clear. There was time to answer remaining questions and then Douglas Robertson was invited to make some closing remarks about the day.

Lastly, delegates went back upstairs for a short service of Communion led by Rev Morven Archer and the conference day brought to an end with a blessing.

#### Summary of feedback comments from discussion groups

#### Question - 1 - What ensures good pastoral care?

- Pastoral care is given in Christ's name which transforms acts of care.
- Diversity of worship/importance of bereavement follow-up after funerals.
- Pastoral care needed for all ages/overlaps with mission.
- Ranges from birth to death.
- Pastoral care should be motivated by concern rather than duty.
- Requires co-ordination and a structured approach to be effective or to improve.
- Pastoral care depends on effective and sensitive communications.
- Allow blurring at the edges between what is deemed Pastoral care/Mission/ Worship.
- Use meeting together for meals e.g. district lunches. Get to know people better.
- Listen. Follow-up where necessary.
- Responsibility is wider than elders it extends to all.
- Mutual support its easier to be supported by somebody you already know.

### **Question 2 - Top ten priorities for the new church?**

- Develop a vision / share it/include the people in this vision/forward looking/ looking outwards. Importance of outreach to young/Young Crown is important/ younger people must take up the reins.
- All ideas to be supported and owned by the congregation.
- Communication(s) all important. Needs to be effective and well organised.
- All present activities need to be up for discussion and review. Don't have to do things how they've always been done. Don't dive into the detail too early!
- Start by caring be a welcoming community to each other. As well as to those in the streets and parish around us.
- Get to know each other through events, through good pastoral care, as well as socialising on a Sunday.
- Identify skills and encourage people to use their own skills. Find ways to overcome vulnerabilities and anxieties. Direct personal approach is key to matching people and tasks.
- Integration/not a takeover/new church is union of equals. Think beyond buildings. Think people.
- Use music as a form of outreach. Good way to bring people together. Look at the kinds of music we use.
- Look at what works well elsewhere/import good practice e.g. pros and cons of district eldership.
- Those who carry out the work at present in each area should suggest/ agree how to proceed.
- Demonstrate the benefits of outreach through retention of St. Stephens's building before the deadline.

### The search for a new name is on!

The Church of Scotland guidance clearly states how important it is to have a strong name for the congregation going forward. The name will be that which is registered in all charitable communications, and that by which the new charge is known throughout the Church. The Law Department in 121 register the name of the congregation with OSCR – Scotland's Charity Regulator and that normally takes around 6 weeks to be finalised.

If we were a business and starting out with Public Relations and Marketing people round the table advising us they would emphasise the importance of a strong name for the company. That applies to churches as well.

How can we choose a name for the new united congregation?

Whilst the boundaries for the new congregation have still to be agreed we know roughly what our boundaries will be and should be looking at landmarks within the area, always remembering that Raigmore Estate and part of the Longman becomes part of our parish, or perhaps there might be a name in the bible which could describe our area and name for our congregation. The name for the Olive Grove came from an anonymous source and I am sure that there will be someone within our congregations who will have that 'lightbulb' moment of thinking of an appropriate name.

Let's look forward when thinking of a name and not take time looking back at the past. It's a new congregation and we need to look forward with our Mission.

How do we consult with the Congregations? We are asking you, the congregation for ideas on names, with these names being put in a sealed envelope addressed to the Session Clerk and you can add you name if you wish. Please place the envelopes in the offering bowl on Sunday morning or send by post to the address below. The closing date for replies will be 19 February and then the two Session Clerks can meet and check what has been submitted.

Bob and Christine (our Session Clerks) both give the weekly announcements prior to the services and they will include this for 3/4 weeks to make sure we can include as many of the congregation as possible.

Thereafter, the names will be considered by both Kirk Sessions who will agree upon the best suggestion and include this within the draft basis of union. The draft basis of union will then be presented to both congregations for their approval.

Hopefully this is a clear procedure and we look forward to innovative names for our new congregation going forward.
