## THOUGHTS FROM REV JAMES

Back in November I was invited to the Armed Forces Chaplaincy Centre at Beckett House near Swindon as part of my role as chaplain to the local Air Cadets. It's located on an MOD base near Swindon. This was a great opportunity to meet up with chaplains from all across the UK and finally meet in person colleagues I had only ever engaged with via Facebook. Just outside the base is the Royal Army Chaplains Museum which if you find yourself in the area is well worth a visit. After walking past the sign on the pond that says "do not walk on the water" you get a



tour which tells the story of British Army chaplaincy from earliest times to the present day, with the help of archive material and historical relics from several centuries. Its collection is dedicated to the work of Army Chaplains throughout history in peacetime, under fire, and in captivity. The museum archives also hold material relating to the department and its history, including information on the four chaplains who have been awarded the Victoria Cross.

I was particularly impressed with the field chapel which was used in Afghanistan, and how the chaplain had managed to cram all the essentials of Church of England worship into a container not much larger than a large suitcase you would take on holiday. I wonder, if I gave you a generous sized box, what would you pack?

Military chaplains have an exceptionally challenging, although rewarding calling. They are often to be found right out in the front lines of conflicts, although they remain unarmed. I know from many who have served that the chaplain is highly valued and respected and helps lift morale.

Each year at our General Assembly, we recognise the work of chaplains within the forces. Last year, the Rev Craig Dobney, who served in the RAF before being called to ministry, said: "When I joined up I was lost to God. Throughout my career my faith slowly came back, mainly through the support and care we get from our chaplaincy teams." He added that his son was now in the Army, and that: "To him, the Chaplain is the parent looking after those boys and girls in the combat areas."

And the Very Rev Dr John Chalmers, whose son JJ was seriously injured while on service in Afghanistan 11 years ago, said military chaplaincy was a key point of ecumenical work in the Church: "When we arrived at the hospital it was a Roman Catholic chaplain, Father Michael Sharkey, who held our hands... in that moment all that matters is you have someone holding the hand of God when you don't know how to do that."

As chaplain to the local Air Cadets, I take my hat off to the chaplains, and not just the Christians, who are there on the front line of conflicts and have an awful lot harder job than me. I ask that you remember them in your prayers, because as long as we fight, there will be a need for someone to be there to provide pastoral care, spiritual support and guidance.

## NEWS FROM THE CONGREGATION

**CONGREGATIONAL VOTE ON PROPOSED UNION WITH CROWN CHURCH** The congregational vote on the proposed union with Crown Church was held on Sunday 14 May. The result was as follows:

The result of the vote was sent to all members on e-mail.

Members of the congregation were able to submit questions (18) prior to the meeting and the Interim Moderator had provided answers to them on the day. Concern was expressed that proxy/postal votes were not permitted. This is the law of the church that only those in person can vote. It would take an act of Assembly to change. Interestingly, St Andrews Church Bo'ness

petitioned the General Assembly this year to have electronic voting. The Legal Questions Committee will now consider this petition but it would still refer to members on the roll and able to access the meeting electronically (Zoom or other).

As a result of this it is likely that OHSS will go into a Deferred Union to take effect when the Minister at the Crown Church retires or demits. The Presbytery Mission Implementation Team meets on Wednesday 7 June and they will advise us of the way forward after that date.

The Kirk Session met on Tuesday 16 May and were sorry to learn that the Interim Moderator, Rev Duncan MacPherson stepped down at the end of the meeting. He was unable to continue due to the term of Interim Moderator likely to be for a considerable time. He was thanked on behalf of the congregation for his help and support over the last 2 months. The Presbytery, who meet in June will advise of a new Interim Moderator in due course. In the meantime, the Kirk Session are unable to meet until this appointment is made. **PRESENTATION TO OUR INTERIM MODERATOR** We were delighted to welcome back our former Interim Moderator Rev Scott Polworth (Inverness Kinmylies) and his family on Sunday 30 April. This is most of what I shared with the congregation on the day.

During the last three years any Minister or Interim Moderator has had the most difficult of times with Covid, Zoom and Microsoft Teams Meetings, Risk Assessments, on-line services, keeping in contact with members remotely, closing a building and then comes a Presbytery Plan with all projects and vacancies sisted until the Plan is approved. The Plan was approved last year but implementation is much more difficult as you know. In March 2022 the Presbytery arranged the closure service at the Old High and during that service you preached the last sermon, bringing to an end hundreds of years of worship on that site. When we were clearing out the Old High we found four half pews which we donated to the Mens' Shed. A few weeks ago I contacted them to ask if they had used all the pew wood and if not would they be able to make something we could present to you. I was asked to visit them one Tuesday (which is wood-working day) and met with five retired gentlemen with much more artistic ideas than I had. During the meeting they realised a colleague was setting up a wood-turning lathe that very day so he joined the meeting as well. The end result is this bowl which is suitably engraved on the bottom as well. This was the first item they made with their lathe and they were really pleased to be asked to make something with such a historic connection to the Church. I also presented a cheque from our congregation. Flowers from the morning service were given to Scott's wife Sharon.



Scott, thank you for the support you gave to our Kirk Session and congregation, we really appreciate it and will

miss having you chairing our meetings always with good humour. Rarely did a meeting go past 9pm and that is an indication of your ability to get through meetings with long agendas. **CORONATIONS AND CHURCH** Whilst sorting through Old High Choir music recently, I came across a Life and Work and OH Supplement from July 1953, when the Senior Minister was Rev Donald MacLeod, the Colleague and Successor was Rev MacLauchlan and the Organist Sandy Halley. The editorial in Life and Work by Jack Stevenson, my father, was inspired by the National Service in St Giles: "the young, newly-crowned Queen requesting that this should be a service for Scotland's sake, as she requested that each one of us would pray for her on her day of coronation". The article cites words from the National Covenant of 1638 - "without God's grace, no word or work of ours is of any avail". It continues: "this is a moment for the Churches to remember that judgement must begin in the house of God. And what might judgement mean for us today if the first preaching of Jesus to His own people from the prophet Isaiah were repeated to us in our situation? Good news from God for the poor, good news for the sufferers from diseases which a hard-hearted society breeds, liberty for all people bowed down by circumstances....."

We may not hear the word 'judgement' used so often nowadays, but the message is surely the same in 2023. The congregation in St Giles was made up of all sections of Scottish society of that day: "there are those here who have no place in pageantry; and the sight of them rightly spoils the pageantry, if that is all it is desired to be". Might the Coronation this month have been 'enhanced' by a little less splendour? The Honours of Scotland were carried into St Giles in 1953: "the Cross surmounting the Crown, a powerful symbol for the day - 'lift high the Cross of Christ' ". A Bible was presented by Rt Rev. James Pitt-Watson, the then Moderator, to the Queen, using the same words as in Westminster Abbey this month: "Here is wisdom; this is the royal law; these are the lively oracles of God".

Alongside that article in the 1953 edition, is a report of findings regarding the distribution of global wealth. "The 19 richest countries in the world have only 16% of the world's population yet enjoy 67% of the world's income. The 15 poorest countries have over 50% of the world's population yet they have to make do with 9% of the world's income". Contrast that with figures from 2023 when 1.2% of the global population (62 million people, equivalent to 1 major country) now holds 47.8% of global wealth whilst 53.3% of the world population holds only 1.1%. How can we avoid the word 'judgement' for not speaking out more effectively against such a massive, further growth of injustice during the 70 years between these Coronations? Andrew Stevenson.
