#### THOUGHTS FROM REV JAMES

I was wondering if we give thanks to the workers of the world often enough. Because unless we are very self sufficient, we always have to rely on someone to do work for us.

International Workers' Day, also known as Labour Day in some countries and often referred to as May Day, is a celebration of labourers and the working classes that is promoted by the international labour movement and occurs every year on 1 May, or the first Monday in May. In many countries, the first Monday in May is celebrated as a public holiday, and the first of May is dedicated to St Joseph the worker, the patron saint of workers and craftsmen. He is also, the patron saint of barristers, emigrants, travellers and, surprisingly, house hunters. I could have done with his assistance late last year.

In the UK, we are lucky to have a string of laws that are in place to ensure workers are protected, for example, the Working Time Directive, the Health and Safety at Work Act, and the Children (Protection at Work) Regulations, which ensures that children under 13 may not be employed, and that full time work may only be given to those who are above school leaving age. All of these laws are in place to protect the health and wellbeing of people in the workplace. And every time you see a law, it was probably put in place because someone, somewhere, had a terrible accident, and it was seen that regulation was required.

However, even though we have a string of laws in place to protect our workers, the same cannot be said for many other countries throughout the world, where lax employment laws, long hours and low wages are used to make the products we may use every day. The elements we use in the batteries in our phones, household appliances and cars are dug out of the ground in places like Congo, where workers toil for about 30p per hour doing backbreaking work. There's no employment protection. No sick days. And apparently, no minimum age for a worker.

#### The bible says

"You shall not oppress a hired worker who is poor and needy, whether he is one of your brothers or one of the sojourners who are in your land within your towns. You shall give him his wages on the same day, before the sun sets (for he is poor and counts on it), lest he cry against you to the Lord, and you be guilty of sin." Deuteronomy 24:14-15 ESV

When we buy or use items, it is clear that we are relying on someone else's hard work. On may Day, and through the rest of the year, please remember to give thanks for those who are far worse off than us, but upon whose labours we rely upon.

**REV PETER NIMMO** The following message was given to the congregation at Cambuslang on Sunday.

It is with much sadness that I am letting you know that I will have to demit as Minister of Cambuslang due to illhealth.

As you know, I have been struggling with my health since I contracted COVID-19 in November 2021. I was left with Long Covid, suffering fatigue which made it impossible for me to work. I was delighted to be able to return to work a year later, in November 2022, but sadly my health broke down again in August 2023, and I was once more left with the frustration of fatigue. As I am still unable to work, Church law now requires that I demit office. Presbytery will consider my request at their meeting on 14 May 2024.

As you can imagine, this has been a difficult time for me, for my wife Katharina, and for our family. As we navigate the next few months, ending our time here, looking for a new place to live, and seeking the path which God intends for us, can I ask that you keep us in your prayers?




THE OLD HIGH CHURCH – SOME HISTORY The silver from the Old High Church was valued recently by Sarah Marr, Beauly. Over the next few newsletters I will illustrate some of the items and some additional history I have managed to get.

We will start with the Baptismal bowl of lipped panelled octagonal form on lipped spreading foot. It is inscribed "Bequeathed to the Woman's Guild of the Old High Church, Inverness by Mrs MacKay, Craigmonie 1942"

The bowl was made by Roberts and Belk, Sheffield 1921 and is 5.5 inches diameter. It was retailed by W B Taylor, Inverness., This company had connections with a member of the Church. Christine MacKenzie, Session Clerk.

#### CRAIGMONIE: BIG HOUSE > MATERNITY HOME >

**HOTEL** Looking on line I found considerable information on the history of the Craigmonie and Mrs Mackay and thought members would be interested in this. It was written by former police officer Dave Conner and I have his permission to reproduce this information. Christine MacKenzie, Session Clerk

# Research by Dave Conner (this has been reproduced with his permission)

What is now the Craigmonie Hotel in Annfield Road, Inverness was originally built as a private house in 1880 for William MacKay LLD (1848-1928), eminent Inverness lawyer and keen and much-published local historian, and a co-founder of the Gaelic Society of Inverness. He held office as Chief of the Society in 1908 and again in 1921. He was a native of Glenurquhart, and called his new abode after his home area. His was the first private home in Inverness to be equipped with a telephone - he was the second telephone subscriber in Inverness, with the number Inverness 2 - and Provost MacAndrew made the first telephone call in Inverness in 1885 when he called Mr MacKay at Craigmonie House. The Town House number was Inverness 1.

The Honourable Mrs Ida Helen Lizzie Merry of Belladrum was the wife of Archibald Merry, proprietor of Belladrum Estate. Kiltarlity. He had inherited it from his father, James Merry MP, who had bought the estate in 1857. Ida (nee Chetwynd) had married Archie Merry on 14 November 1899. Ida's mother was the daughter of Baron Macdonald of Sleat, and her maternal grandfather was Duncan Davidson, 4th of Tulloch, Dingwall (Lord Lieutenant of Ross-shire). A local philanthropist with a particular interest in health and maternity matters, Mrs Merry established the Ida Merry Maternity Home (IMMH) in 1919. It was supported by endowments and much hard work in fund-raising. Until 1930 the IMMH was located at 101 Church Street and was called the "Mother's Welcome, Bowmont Centre". At its AGM in October 1930 it was identified that a large building was required. In July 1931 was announced that it was transferring to the former family home of Mr Mackay, "Craigmonie", Annfield Road, with hopes to open in early August. Mr Mackay had died in 1928.

The new home was opened on 3 September 1931 by Lady Dawking, lady in waiting to the Queen. Queen Mary (grandmother of our present Queen)had also sent her good wishes. In September 1931 it was reported by the British Medical Journal: "Inverness Maternity Home "The opening ceremony of the Ida Merry Maternity Home, situated in a new property at Craigmonie, Inverness, was performed on September 3rd by Lady Bertha Dawkins on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen. "The home was established by the Hon. Mrs. Merry of Belladrum some years ago, and has now been transferred to more commodious quarters. It is intended for working men's wives of the Inverness district, and occupies a finely appointed building with open surroundings."

The local press reported that Mr Archibald Merry had paid  $\pounds$ 2,400 for the new house, but would recover  $\pounds$ 600 from the sale of the Church Street premises. This was achieved when in 1932 the YWCA took over the Church Street premises as their new Flora Macdonald Centre.

Craigmonie remained home to the IMMH - full title "THE IDA MERRY MATERNITY HOME and BOWMONT CENTRE FOR THE WIVES OF WORKING MEN" until its closure during the 1940s. It seems to have been a victim of its own success, in that demand for its services exceeded the income raised from fundraising. A number of fundraising events were held, including fetes both at the home itself and at Belladrum, but demand for the Home's services continued to grow at a faster level than the Home's trustees could raise money. The establishment also seemed to have trouble recruiting, and retaining, nursing staff - there were frequent advertisements placed in national publications. This is hardly surprising as, unlike large hospitals, the Merry Home was a small undertaking - the few staff would be kept so very busy, and literally run off their feet. Efforts were made to have the Inverness Town Council take over the running of the premises - but this was declined in September 1940, the Council concluding they could not assume control "because the funds had been too securely conveyed to trustees".

Prior to that, in August 1940 Mrs Merry had decided to keep the premises open for another 3 months to give interested parties an opportunity to come up with some sort of survival package. Meanwhile Rosedene had opened as the Town's Maternity Home in March 1940. A converted domestic house which provided sixteen beds, it was formerly the Northern Counties Children's Home. Although it disappeared off the radar after 1942, it would appear the Ida Merry Home continued in some form before finally closing completely in 1945, and it therefore did not transfer to the National Health Service (in 1948).

Archibald Merry died in 1933, and Mrs Merry commissioned the construction of a memorial chapel known as the Gibbs Chapel - on Belladrum Estate, Mr Merry's ashes were interred there, as were those of Mrs Ida Merry after she passed away in 1950.

The house Craigmonie thereafter became a hotel, a role it still fulfils today, albeit nowadays in a much altered and extended form.
