Registered Charity No. SC035073 **THOUGHTS FROM REV JAMES** So, shall we address the elephant in the room? That small matter of an election that will take place in July and that you'll be sick of hearing about soon...

There has always been a part of me tempted to chip in the £500 deposit and stand to become your local MP. My plan though, was to change my name to Zzzachary Zzzippy and found the political party called "None of the Above" That way I'd appear on the bottom of the ballot paper, and hopefully collect the protest votes... The part of this plan I've not quite thought through is what do I do if I actually get elected...?

So yes, there is an election coming up, and yes, in the pulpit, in theory we are supposed to be politically neutral. In John Wesley's journal, dated 6th October 1774 he wrote:

"I met those of our society who had votes in the ensuing election, and advised them

1. To vote, without fee or reward, for the person they judged most worthy

- 2. To speak no evil of the person they voted against, and
- 3. To take care their spirits were not sharpened against those that voted on the other side."

In the time Wesley wrote these words, In order to vote, a person had to own property or pay certain taxes to qualify, which excluded most working class people. There were also constituencies with several voters that elected two MPs to Parliament, such as Old Sarum in Salisbury. In these 'rotten boroughs', with few voters and no secret ballot, it was easy for those standing for election to buy votes. At least nowadays, everyone over 18 has the vote.

Wesley's words are still as valid today, as they were in 1774. Perhaps even more so, when the press and social media will strive to stir up division. We are no better or worse than someone who wears a different coloured rosette than ours. Back in the days of the bible, Jesus mixed with and challenged the political groups of the day, such as the Pharisees, Sadducees and Herodians, and they would each seek to trap Jesus. In Mark 12:13-17 we read:

The Question about Paying Taxes

Some Pharisees and some members of Herod's party were sent to Jesus to trap him with questions. They came to him and said, "Teacher, we know that you tell the truth, without worrying about what people think. You pay no attention to anyone's status, but teach the truth about God's will for people. Tell us, is it against our Law to pay taxes to the Roman Emperor? Should we pay them or not?"

But Jesus saw through their trick and answered, "Why are you trying to trap me? Bring a silver coin, and let me see it."

They brought him one, and he asked, "Whose face and name are these?"

"The Emperor's," they answered.

So Jesus said, "Well, then, pay to the Emperor what belongs to the Emperor, and pay to God what belongs to God."

And they were amazed at Jesus. (GNT ©1992)

Jesus was not afraid to challenge the authorities of the day, and neither should we. Respectful dialogue is always appropriate. However when it comes to placing the X in the box, ask yourself, is the candidate and the party they represent someone who truly upholds Christian values? Will they look out for the sick, the poor, the immigrant and the marginalised, just like we were commanded to do? It's never easy. But most importantly, don't waste your vote, out of respect for those who fought and died to get yours, and for those who do not have a voice.

So a grand total raised so far of $\pm 3,016$, which is up around 20% on last year's total. Well done to everyone for making this possible. Deborah Macrae.


SWEATY CHURCH 27 APRIL 2024

The inscriptions are as follows:

Vase 1

In mem Isobel Fraser

Vase 2

Presented to the High Church Inverness by friends, in grateful memory of the faithful life of Mrs Isobel Fraser and her devoted service to the poor Born 1853 and entered into rest 12 May 1918

It would be interesting to find out what her work with the poor was. Freda Charters is a Trustee at Isobel Fraser Home in Mayfield Road and she took the vases to show the other Trustees and staff at a recent meeting.

REPORT FROM CROWN YOUTH WORKER First Couple of Months at Young Crown Presently the most part of my outreach work is with toddlers on Wednesday and Thursday morning, which requires, along with the volunteers, setting up play equipment, crafts, making teas and coffees chatting, and singing nursery rhymes with the children mums and dads. Most days at toddlers we have an average of 21 vistors, 10 parents and their children. We regularly have new mums and their babies which is a real blessing. Since accepting this post, I have become a Scripture Union Scotland Registered Team Leader. This required online training and a few meetings with Colin Carmichael, Regional Worker Highlands, Scripture Union Scotland. Colin has been very helpful in helping me with coming to grips with Scripture Union Scotland online material, in particular One Big Story a valuable resource based on games, bible stories and reflection. I am in contact with Mrs Macdonald, Head Teacher at Crown Primary in the hope that we can plan some Scripture Union fun for the children.

I attend Monday Night Club at Kinmylies Church of Scotland, which is run by Anne Gunn a Youth Worker Leader with a wealth of experience. The Monday night Club has around 40 children in attendance and they even have a waiting list! This is something I intend to pray for, and in the hope that a club in the evening can be established at Crown Church.

I have also attended Sweaty Church at St Stephen's attended by around 30 Primary School children, many of who I knew from working at Crown Corner Club. Stewart Robertson told the story of Daniel in the Lion's Den. Kirsty and Jack who are PE instructors led the children in very active games and we then had Pizza and Snacks hosted at St Stephen's. The children thoroughly enjoyed it. Oh, and yes, they did go home sweaty! This week some of the children from Crown Corner Club came to the garden and planted lots of bedding plants. They did a grand job and were rewarded with a plant from Douglas and Jane Wilson who were overseeing the project. The children had a cold drink and a sweetie. Fiona the manager at Crown Corner Club said they came back looking like they had fun.
