It wasn't a big thing, but it was said with the shared realisation that we both have a lot in our diaries before then. PARISH GROUPING

As you are aware a copy of the document was circulated in the September 2024 newsletter. Three small changes have since been made to the document:

- 1 Start date changed to 1 January 2025 and remain in place for up to one year
- 2 Change of Interim Moderator from Rev James Bissett to Mrs Aileen Binner
- 3 Adding Christian Aid to the list of joint activities

An amended copy is attached to this newsletter. Please note that the Kirk Session of Old High St Stephen's approved this document at their meeting on Tuesday 13 November 2024.

Members of the congregation now have to approve the document and a meeting is being arranged for Tuesday 7 January 2025 at 2.00 pm in St Stephen's Church. This meeting will be chaired by our Interim Moderator, Aileen Binner.

Each year we have to have an **Annual Stated Meeting**. The Trustees (Kirk Session) approved the accounts and the audited copy was circulated with the August newsletter. However members of the congregation are entitled to ask questions about the accounts and other matters and this meeting will be held on the same day - **Tuesday 7 January 2025**.

The Kirk Session of OHSS and Crown held a joint meeting on Wednesday 20 November to discuss the Parish Grouping document and now hope to work together to form new focus groups going forward. Christine MacKenzie, Session Clerk

SALE OF OLD HIGH CHURCH It is with much regret that I have to inform you that the seller has not completed the deal within the deadline laid down. The Trustees (Kirk Session) agreed last week that no further extension was to be granted.

This has been a long protracted process with nothing at the end of it and is costing us considerable sums of money, particularly with regard to insurance.

Following advice from our Solicitor in 121 the Church will go back on the market.

Not the conclusion we had hoped for and a considerable amount of work has been done over the last 12 months to try and get the deal concluded without success.

OPPORTUNITIES TO PARTICIPATE IN THE CHURCH NATIONALLY - NOMINATIONS NOW OPEN

Dear fellow members of the Church of Scotland, The Church is going through a time of significant change, locally, regionally and nationally.

The people who make the decisions about the Church nationally include staff, those who attend the General Assembly, and those who, between times, make time to participate in a national group or committee. The Nomination Committee now needs your active support to find the right people to serve on these groups and committees

Maybe you, or someone you know, have the potential to rise to the occasion. We are looking for people with vision and determination, who are willing to help our Church in the years ahead as we work our way through the challenges and the necessary restructuring to make the Church of Scotland fit for the future. A short video, accessible here, explains the process in further detail.

Those who wish to serve are invited to complete an online nomination form, accessible here on the Church of Scotland website, with someone - from their local congregation or Presbytery - saying they support the nomination. The form may seem long. That's because the more relevant information we have, the better we are able to do our job of placing people on the various groups and committees.

Serving nationally is a good way of getting to know the Church better, and engaging with others from across the country and beyond. While it needs commitment and can be time-consuming and demanding, it is a real opportunity to extend one's Christian service and witness.

Nominees must be members of the Church of Scotland. In addition, due to the high expectations placed on Candidates in Training, Probationers and Ministers in their first year following ordination, they are not normally invited to serve on committees.

Nominations must reach us by Monday 6 January 2025. We will treat the forms confidentially and consider them carefully. We meet on Wednesday 29 and Thursday 30 January 2025 and those selected will then be contacted. This is to seek permission from the individual for their name to go to the General Assembly in May 2025 for approval. Appointments commence after the General Assembly.

Not everyone will be asked to serve, or sometimes they may be asked if they are willing to serve on a committee or group other than those they have mentioned on their form. Please could you ensure that people know this when they are considering nomination.

We are keen to receive nominations from a broad representation across the church and depend on you and others spreading the word and actively encouraging involvement.

SOME HISTORY Continung our series of articles on the history and silver belonging to the Old High


We have six silver communion cups from the Old High. They are straight sided bowls on a reeded knopped stem with a reeded spreading foot. The are inscribed 'Gift from John Baillie, House Carpenter to the Kirk Session. They were made

by Alexander Stewart, Inverness circa 1810. They weigh 120ozs troy. Height 24cm \times 13cm base diameter \times 12 cm top diameter. Note they are made from rare Inverness Silver. Christine Mackenzie, Session Clerk.

PRISONER'S WEEK SCOTLAND Prisoner's Week Scotland is always the third week in November. The Theme this year was: "Hear My Voice"

Prisoner's Week is arranged by a consortium of Churches, Prison Alpha, Prison Fellowship and Scottish Prison Service (SPS) Chaplains and Governors to encourage action and support for Prisoners on release, their families, and Victims of Crime. Liberated men and women do best if they have purpose and routine, eg a job, regular income, secure housing, stable family relationships, and a new circle of friends who will not drag them back to negative activity. Some of the above may be in the gift of congregational members to offer and make a difference to someone's life.

Inverness Prison is currently in the Parish of OHSS, (this will change in 2026/7 when a new prison is opened between UHI and The Range).

So what are OHSS doing in this connection as a community church?

At Christmas over many years the congregation has supported prisoners, their children and families through The Giving Tree, or the opportunity to provide a cash donation of around £350. This has been used to buy presents, provide toiletries, and for some mum's and children to go to the pantomime.

Recipients of OHSS contributions to The Food Bank, and Cafe 1668, will include ex-offenders.

During previous Prisoner's Week there have been 'Moments for Mission' by SPS Staff and from Prison Fellowship, and this year this article in the newsletter to inform the congregation.

OHSS also allow Prison Fellowship to meet, and park, in our premises.

In the 1990's the then OHSS minister Rev Colin Anderson, who was also a prison chaplain asked David and Ruth Martin to be elders to a prisoner, they readily agreed and have run the Prison Fellowship Inverness ever since and so another connection was made between the OHSS congregation and the prison and their families.

Prison Fellowship has grown over the years and now has 15 volunteers who are trained and go into Inverness Prison. They work under the Chaplaincy and have developed trust and very good relations with staff and the around 1,000 prisoners who chose to come to the PF activities, week in and week out over a year: Monday afternoon Bible Study. Thursday evening Crafts and Alpha or Restorative Justice Courses. Friday attend weekly service and take the Service

on the last Friday of the month. Friday Evening Music Night, singing songs and there are plans for musical tuition. PF also attend Prison events such as Easter Service where they supply Easter eggs, Remembrance Service where they supply the poppies, Remembering Service where prisoners can remember family and friends whose funerals they were unable to attend, and send Christmas Cards to all 110 prisoners, and also to staff.

Although Prison Fellowship is a Christian organisation with members from various churches and fellowships, not all sessions are gospel based. A strong emphasis is put on the 'Fellowship' aspect. Prisoners are genuinely amazed that PF volunteers give their time for no payment and respect PF as being nonjudgmental and lifting the boredom and inane banter of regular conversation. PF provide 'decent' tea coffee and biscuits for most sessions, translations of bibles or books in foreign languages for non English speakers, distributes Gideon bibles and study bibles and generally provide a highlight from routine boredom and a safe place where prisoners can re-evaluate their lives and past actions through Meeting Jesus and his teaching.

A sobering thought is that Scotland has the highest prison population per capita in Europe for both men and women, with around 8,000 on any day, and the scary fact is that we may not be much different from those 8,000, just that we were not caught! "Hear my Voice" could be a prisoner, or Jesus. Could we be better listeners? David Martin (Prison Fellowship, Inverness)

BASIS OF PARISH GROUPING

The congregation of Inverness Crown (SC0108159) and the congregation of Old High St Stephen's (SC0035073) (shall form a Parish Grouping for a period of up to 12 months from the first day of January 2025, and that on the following terms and conditions:

- 1. Name: The name of the Parish Grouping shall be Midmills Church Parish Grouping.
- 2. **Territorial Responsibility:** The bounds to be served by the Parish Grouping shall be as already advised by the Presbytery of Inverness and West Moray now part of CIE or as the Presbytery may determine.
- 3. **Property and Funds:** The property and funds belonging to or held on behalf of each congregation shall remain the property and funds of each congregation as at present.
- 4. Kirk Sessions: The Moderator of the Crown Church Kirk Session is Rev Douglas Robertson. The Interim Moderator of the OHSS Kirk Session is Aileen Binner. The two Kirk Sessions will come together to discuss specific issues as and when required. Currently Crown meet 6 times per year and OHSS 8 times per year. A joint meeting of the two Kirk Sessions has been arranged for November 2024 and will continue quarterly if required.
- 5. **Congregational Management:** The temporal affairs of each congregation shall be administered as at present.
- 6. **Ministry Team:** The Ministry Team shall be

Jackie MacKenzie – Youth Worker – note that Jackie is locally funded by Young Crown which is operated as a separate charity.

- 7. **Ministry Team Support:** The stipend of the minister(s) shall be payable in terms of the National Stipend Scheme.
- 8. **Manse(s):**

The Crown manse is currently occupied by Rev Douglas Robertson and his wife. The OHSS manse is currently rented out.

9. **Areas of Co-operation:** The following areas are currently shared:

A	Sweaty Church (OHSS) meets every two months
В	SNAC (Crown) meets monthly

C	Friendship Club (Crown) meets fortnightly
D	Memorable Melodies (OHSS) – meets monthly
Е	Alpha – to meet in September
F	Fit as a Fiddle – meets fortnightly
G	Advent/Lent Calendars/Parish Newsletter
Н	Other charities such as Blythswood, 1668 cafe, Giving trees at Christmas
I	Young Crown – set up as separate charity but Trustees from both congregations
J	Launchpad – set up as separate charity but Trustees from both congregations.
K	Christian Aid – annual appeal

Going forward it may be possible to combine both newsletters.

Crown have contact with North Street Church, Kingston, Jamaica and an invitation to visit Jamaica is likely to be given in 2025 with a reciprocal visit to the UK in 2026.

10. Power to Adjust:

While the articles and terms shall form the Basis of Parish Grouping for the congregations now agreeing, the congregations shall be free, like any other congregation, to adjust arrangements under the authority of the Presbytery as need may arise.
